<u>AVID News:</u> <u>What are the AVID Levels of Questions?</u>

Level One

Level One thinking causes students to recall information. This level of question causes students to input the data into short term memory, but if they don't use it in some meaningful way, they may soon forget. Example: Name the planets of the Solar System.

Level Two

Level Two thinking enables students to process information. They expect students to make sense of information they have gathered and retrieved from long and short term memory.

Example: Compare and contrast the planets of Jupiter and Saturn.

Level Three

Level Three thinking requires students to go beyond the concepts or principles they have learned and to use these in novel or hypothetical situations.

Example: Use what you know about Earth to analyze

why other planets are uninhabitable

i-Ready Family Center

How Can I Support My Student?

- Speak with your child about how using *i-Ready* will help him or her grow in school. *i-Ready* shows where your child is doing well and where your child needs some more review. It helps teachers understand how to give your child the best support, and it lets your child see the gains they will make throughout the school year.
- Help your child prepare for the Diagnostic by explaining that some questions on the Diagnostic test will be hard and that it's okay not to know the answer to every question. Questions on the Diagnostic get a little harder each time a question is answered correctly, and a little easier when answered incorrectly. The goal is to figure out the math or reading level that is "just right" for your child, so your child should expect to see some questions that are too hard—and that's okay! It means the test is working correctly.
- Encourage your child to take each lesson and test question seriously. Emphasize "thinking before clicking," because just clicking through answers will not give teachers an accurate picture of what is understood and what requires further instruction.
