## Helping your child build comprehension

Children learn when they make connections between what they hear and what they know. One method parents can use to help make these connections is called a *think aloud*, where you talk through your thoughts as you read. Here are three ways to use *think alouds*, with examples from some of our favorite kids' books:

- 1. Connect the book to your child's own life experience Example: A River Dream by Allen Say "This book reminds me of the time my father took me fishing. Do you remember the time we went fishing?"
- 2. Connect the book to other books they have read. Example: Mufaro's Beautiful Daughters by John Steptoe Say, "This story reminds me of Cinderella. Both stories are about sisters. Do you know any other stories about nice and mean sisters? Let's keep reading to find out other ways the stories are similar."
- 3. Connect the book to big ideas/lesson. Example: Stellaluna by Janell Cannon Say, "This story helps me understand that we are all the same in many ways, but it's our differences that make us special."
