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Manatee Highlight: A Word from our ILC, Mrs. Amy Borie

Hello Mason Families,

My name is Amy Borie. I am the instructional Literacy Coach and MTSS/RTI Coordinator at Otis Mason Elementary School. I am a graduate of the University of Florida with a degree in Reading and Elementary Education. I also have degree from the University of North Florida in Educational Leadership. This year marks my 21st year as an educator. I love my role as an ILC at Mason. Supporting all our manatees, both teachers and students, makes my job so meaningful!

Are you looking for tips to strengthen your student as a reader? One way is by building reading stamina! Please read below!



Building Reading Stamina

Having stamina for something means being able to stick with something for periods of time. This stamina, or endurance, builds strength. Stamina can apply to lots of different areas, such as exercise or painting. It can also apply to reading. Teachers often think about a student's reading stamina. Reading stamina is a child's ability to focus and read independently for long-ish periods of time without being distracted or without distracting others. Reading stamina is something that parents can help students develop. Here's how:

- 1. Vary the way the reading is done. Parents can think about this in terms of having their child "read to himself, read to someone, and listen to reading." Some combination of the three should make up the reading time, especially for new or struggling readers.
- 2. Choose "just right" books. If your child is at a stage of being able to read alone, help him choose books that he is able to read independently. This means he should be able to decode almost every word in the book correctly. In this situation, avoid using books that are too difficult to read alone. If your child will be reading with you, choose books that are lively and engaging.
- 3. Set reasonable goals. Most toddlers and preschoolers find it difficult to sit for long periods of time, even with the most engaging book! When starting out, limit book time to just a few minutes and work up from there. For elementary aged readers, consider starting with 10-15 minutes of reading time, and work up from there. Add a few minutes to your reading time every week or so.
- 4. Celebrate progress. Without getting too caught up on the number of minutes spent reading, celebrate the time that is spent reading. Share your favorite parts of books read, plan the next visit to the library, and share progress with other family members.

Spending longer periods of time reading means fewer interruptions and more time reading what you love. As your child moves into higher grades, having reading stamina will help your child navigate the longer texts and assignments. Using these tips can help develop more stamina in your reader. Character Highlight: This Month is all about the Pillar of RESPECT!

Every month our school highlights and teaches a different pillar of character. The focus for the month of January is RESPECT. Why is respect so important? - How can we make teaching manners fun? Model and teach your child good manners with a Fancy Tea Party Night or by hosting a dinner with friends and family. Use real-life examples as teachable moments.
- Respect your child by letting them problem solve their issues first. When appropriate, allow your child to solve their own problems first. Students really appreciate the opportunity to problem solve.
- Some things never change: Follow the Golden Rule! Empathy is so important! Coach your child to imagine how their words and actions affect others.
- **Show respect with your language:** Children will follow your lead so let them hear positive, respectful language especially in times of conflict.
- Highlight and respect differences in our world. Show your child the glorious tapestry all different cultures create when we come together as one world! All people share a common humanity and yet we are spectacularly different. Let's celebrate it!
- How does respect look...? ...in the car? ...in the home? ...in the hallway? ...in school? ... with family? ... with people we don't know? ...in a restaurant? Always have a discussion with your child about how to show respect, even when it may be challenging.

A Letter from our RTI/MTSS Team:

Dear OMES Families.

MTSS/RtI meeting invitations are sent via email to the parent/quardian email on file. If your child's teacher has communicated with you that they have referred your child for a possible RtI plan, you can expect to see an initial meeting invitation via email, if student data meets criteria. If your child already has an RtI plan, there are typically review meetings on a six-to-eight-week basis. When you receive an email, there is an option to participate virtually, receive a phone call, or attend in person. If you would like for the school based MTSS/RtI team to phone conference with you, you must reply to the email to request this option. Every quarter at Otis A. Mason Elementary School, we recognize, celebrate, and award all students who have perfect attendance. Every quarter is a new opportunity for your student to earn perfect attendance.

Please join us in making sure your child attends school as much as possible. If a child becomes ill or has an appointment, remember to send in a note to excuse the absence. Every minute of the school day is important to us. A student is always welcome to attend school after an appointment, even if they will only be with us for a couple hours! Some grade levels have significant math, science, reading, and writing instruction in the first and/or last 45 minutes of the day.





We are committed to having every student at or above grade level!

The state of Florida has an ambitious goal to have every student reading at or above grade level. We here at the St. Johns County School District take this goal very seriously. Letters come home regularly to keep you informed of:

- If your child is having reading difficulties
- Which diagnostic assessments will be used to assist your child
- Which plan will be used to monitor your child's progress
- The nature of the reading instruction received by your child daily
- The nature of the targeted instruction that will be used to assist your child
- The name of the program (s) used to target instruction

These letters will inform you and encourage home-toschool communication

Know Your Parental Rights

There have been recent legislative updates to parental rights. The highlights of which are listed below:

- The Parents' Bill of Rights (s. 1014.04 (1)(a), F.S.) states that a parent has the right to direct the education and care of his or her minor child.
- Upon written request, school districts are required to provide parents access to any material or book in a school library specified in the request (s.1006.28 (2)(d), F.S.)
- Per Rule 6A-7.0713, F.A.C. each elementary school is required to publish on its website a list of all materials maintained in the school library media center including classroom libraries.
- Parents must be informed of the district policies that are in place to provide transparency for families.

"Hats" Off to Reading (wear hats)


There is nothing better than sharing an adventure with your child.
