Our K-2 students will begin important FAST testing soon. These tests help us understand your child's progress and guide instruction for the second semester. To ensure your child is ready:

- ✓ Attendance Matters Please make sure your child is at school every day and on time.
- **▼ Rest & Nutrition** A good night's sleep and a healthy breakfast are essential for success.
- **✓ Headphones** Students need a working set of headphones at school for testing.

Grades 3–5 will begin testing in **January**, and we'll share more details before the winter break.

Attention: New SJCSD Policy Having someone other than a parent or guardian check your child out from school?

The SJCSD now requires that explicit parent permission is given for that "other" person to pick up on that particular time and day. This is IN ADDITION to that person being on your child's approved pick-up list. In an effort to make this easier on parents, we hope to use an already existing practice:

If your child is being picked up early by someone other than a parent or guardian, please complete a Dismissal Change Form (located at the top of our website) to inform us of the person's name and day of early dismissal. This policy is being enforced to aid with safety concerns by multiple members of our community.

As always, please review your child's emergency contact list each year during Returning Student Verification to ensure that only safe adults have access to your child. Journey through the Holidays with the Six Pillars of Character
